


The City of New Port Kichey hosts the Concerts in the Park Series at Sims Park in downtown New Port Richey. (Banks and Main Sts.) Bring your chairs and enjoy the beautiful Florida evenings under the moonlight. Food and beverages will be available from the various venders.

The next concert ~ **ABBA Tribute** ~ is Saturday, April 16, from 7:00pm to 8:30pm. The original ABBA group was from Sweden. Maybe you remember a few of their catchy songs – "Waterloo," "Mamma Mia," and "Dancing Queen" – which were popular 1972 to 1982. The concert is **FREE!** 

Also FREE is transport on the DART (courtesy trolley)! You can hop on at the parking garage at US19 and Main; parking there is also FREE! The trolley will drop you off right at Sims Park and take you back to the parking garage. The trolley schedule on Saturday is from noon to midnight. The parking garage is open daily from 7:30 am to midnight.





New Port Richey, is a residential community, with a population of 17,490, has a strong local government and an attractive historical downtown.

Since its incorporation, the city is most recognized for its cultural heritage and unique riverfront landscape.

New Port Richey's geography

blends nature, beaches, and great shopping with restaurants, culture and business - all with a small-town feel.

### How it all began ...

In December 1883, Aaron McLaughlin Richey (1837-1912), with his wife and daughter, came from Missouri and settled near the mouth of the Cotee River (an abbreviation of the Indian name Pithlachascotee). His homestead's location became familiarly known as Richey Point.

Shortly after, he established a post office and called it Port Richey. He was its first postmaster, and also opened a small store at that location. Because of his travels by boat along the river and coast to deliver mail and packages - and ferry passengers when needed - he was soon known as Captain Richey.

The actual beginning of New Port Richey dates from 1911, when W. E. Guilford drew up a plan for a

future city further inland on the Cotee River. He surveyed locations for many of the proposed city's streets and avenues, and his plan has been followed with very little deviation since that date. After George R. Sims moved to the city in 1916 and opened the Sims Land Office, the development of New Port Richey was steady and rapid.

On December 22, 1919, Dr. Elroy M. Avery founded the Avery Library and Historical Society (now the New Port Richey Public Library and The West Pasco Historical Society). The Avery Library opened its doors to the public in April 1920, and provided impetus for the founding of the City of New Port Richey. On October 27, 1924, residents voted 201:4 in favor of incorporating New Port Richey, and chose Elroy M. Avery as their first mayor. He was sworn in on October 29, 1924.

In December of 1924, George Sims deeded his land around Orange Lake, then popularly known as Enchantment Park, to the city's residents in perpetuity. Because of the brand-new city's Ordinance One (a code that regulates when and where alcoholic beverages can be distributed

> within the city), the beautiful riverfront gathering spot in the center of town (now known as Sims Park) will forever belong to the people of New Port Richey.

Global crude oil prices have been on the rise causing U.S. gas prices hitting a new national record. To help you maximize your miles per gallon, check out these tips ...

**COMBINE SHORT TRIPS** Warm engines run more efficiently than cold ones. Run multiple errands at one time rather than making shorter, separate trips from a cold start. Also share a ride with someone going in the same direction and split the cost of gas.

**CUT DOWN ON A/C and KEEP WINDOWS** 

**CLOSED** Running your car's air conditioner uses about 20% more fuel. AAA recommends cutting the A/C five minutes before you reach your destination and parking in the shade or a garage.

#### DON'T ACCELERATE OR BRAKE TOO HARD

Applying slow accelerating and braking can increase your fuel economy by 20%.

AVOID IDLING Leaving the engine running while the vehicle isn't moving uses more fuel than restarting the engine.

GAS STATIONS Keep in mind that gas stations near major highways often charge more for gas because of their overhead costs. Fill up at a local station

before a road trip. Get gas and run errands when the roads are less crowded. Use apps and websites like Gas Guru, GasBuddy and MapQuest to check local prices and find the cheapest fuel near you.

There are ten **National Holidays** in the United States. However, there are a myriad of days noted as "National" Holidays" on every day of the month all year long. The titles "National" associated with these days have not been a proclamation as such by the President of the United States. These additionally created National Holidays were for the purpose of promoting a group or cause, to build a brand or business, to give special recognition, or just for fun. Here's one of the many "National Holidays" in April ...



#### April 1 – National One Cent Day

This day honors the major point in the establishment of the American currency. In 1787 the U.S. issued the first coin, designed by Benjamin Franklin. On one side the coin read "Mind Your Business," and on the other side "We Are One." These coins were handcrafted and minted by workers without the use of machines. The coins were bigger than they are today and made entirely of copper. In 1792 the U.S. Minting was established and a new design was introduced on April 1, 1793. These

new coins wore a symbol of the Statue of Liberty with the image of a lady with flowing hair and the other side showed 13 chains representing the 13 colonies. It weighed about 0.4 ounces and was a little over 1 inch in diameter. As years went by, the coin's size was reduced to make it easier to handle. Several other changes were made since then from an eagle wreath and the head of an American Indian to President Lincoln's face. The metal was reduced from 100% copper to 97.5% zinc and only 2.5% copper.
