RELIGIOUS CELEBRATIONS IN APRIL



Passover's dates are based on the lunar cycle. It starts in the middle of the month of Nisan, when the moon is full, typically falling in March or April of the Gregorian (modern) calendar. This year Passover begins at sundown on April 5 and ends at sundown on April 13.

Passover, or *Pesach* in Hebrew, is one of the Jewish religion's most sacred and widely observed holidays. In Judaism, Passover commemorates the Hebrews' liberation from slavery in Egypt (in the 13th century). Their doors were painted with lambs blood to signify "passing over" and sparing of the firstborn of the Israelites. During Passover the members of the Jewish faith are forbidden to eat bread that has risen. The

belief is that the Israelites had to leave Egypt so quickly that they did not have time to let their bread rise. Matzah, a special type of flat bread which has not risen is accepted.

Passover is often celebrated with great pomp and ceremony, especially on the first night, when a special family meal called the *seder* is held. The seder itself is based on the Biblical verse commanding Jews to retell the story of the Exodus from Egypt. Seder customs include telling the story, discussing the story, drinking four cups of wine, eating <u>matza</u>, partaking of symbolic foods, and reclining in celebration of freedom. Prayers and traditional recitations are performed. Though the festival of Passover is meant to be one of great rejoicing, strict dietary laws must be observed, and special prohibitions restrict work at the beginning and end of the celebration. During the meal, the door is left open for the prophet Elijah, who is an important religious person, as it is believed he will come to announce the coming of the Messiah. Families also read the *Haggadah* - a book that tells the Passover story - with songs and blessings. Children will ask questions and everyone will discuss the story.



Lent, the 40/46 days preceding Easter, have been a time of fasting, prayer, and study for those wishing to grow closer to God. It can be a time of personal transformation and reflection. During the earliest celebrations of Lent, worshippers fasted (except for water) but not on Sundays. Most who recognize Lent sacrifice something for the season – anything from chocolate to bad habits and do not eat meat on Fridays.

Easter is the most important festival in the Christian calendar, and is celebrated by thousands of people all over the world. It celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ on the third day after his crucifixion. Fixing the date on which the resurrection of Jesus was to be observed and celebrated triggered a major controversy in early Christianity in which an Eastern and Western position can be distinguished. The dispute, known as the Paschal Controversies, was not definitively resolved until the 8th century. Thus, based on mathematical

calculations, Easter falls on the first Sunday after the full Moon date, that falls on or after March 21st. If the Full Moon is on a Sunday, Easter is celebrated on the following Sunday. This year Easter is Sunday April 9th.

Lamb is a traditional Easter food. Christians refer to Jesus as the "Lamb of God." Easter Lilies symbolize the purity of Christ. Their growth from dormant bulbs in the ground to flowers symbolize the rebirth and hope of Christ's resurrection.

Easter traditions and symbols have evolved over time. The most prominent secular symbol of the holiday - the Easter Bunny - was reportedly introduced to America by German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania in the 1700s. They brought over their stories of an egg-laying hare. The children decorated eggs and made nests in which the Easter Bunny would lay its eggs. The traditions have evolved over time. Now decorated baskets replace nests and are filled with chocolate candy and other treats. Children often lay out carrots for the Bunny in case he gets hungry from all his hopping.

Dating back to the 1800s, in New York City, the Easter Parade consisted of the upper crust of society. They would attend Easter services at various Fifth Avenue churches then stroll (*parade*) outside afterward, showing off their new spring outfits and hats. Although the Easter Parade has no Christian significance, parades are on-going today. The parades now will have live processions of floats, marching bands, classic cars fancy hats, beauty queens and of course the Easter Bunny.

We [the HOA board] have hit the ground running! We have begun to catch up with repairs requests. We are currently utilizing DLS Construction & Cabinet Warehouse Co. The problem has been the inability to find a "handyman" company and then they must meet mandated criteria - liability insurance, worker comp, multiple business licenses or certifications, etc. Thank you for your patience! Please look at your property and submit work requests as needed.

The current contractor will **clean your gutters**. They will charge \$75 for a single request and \$65 if they receive multiple requests. The HOA may serve as a "go between" only. We will collect the name, address and bldg./unit number. Residents will need to pay the contractor directly. Arrangements will be

determined based on the number of residents requesting service. **If you would like to have your gutters cleaned, please put a work request in** at our website: briarpatchnpr.com, Online Forms, Work Request.

We are continuing to acquire roofing estimates for the oldest roofs in the community. We will dissect each estimate in a comparative analysis. We have a primary requirement - contractor must be GAF Certified. Once the analysis is completed a report will be sent forward to the President and Finance committee for their review. The estimated average cost to Re-Roof **one** of our buildings is \$50,000.00 we have 35 residential buildings. You "Do the Math".
