Of the American patriotic songs, "Yankee Doodle" is one of the most popular. (*It is also the state song of Connecticut.*) However, despite its popularity and remarkably pervasive staying power, it started out as a song that made fun of American troops during the American Revolution.

"Yankee Doodle Dandy" became popular among the British - as well as the rebels. A "doodle" was a simpleton and the phrase "stuck a feather in his hat and called it macaroni" implied the backwoods bumpkins could put a feather in their coonskin hat and think they were as elegant as Europeans in the latest Italian style. There are a number of choruses to the song, but only the first one is the one well known. The rebels sang the song as a way of showing the British they didn't care.

From Drinking Song to American Anthem

Attorney Francis Scott Key had been helping to negotiate the release of an American civilian, Dr. William Beanes, who had been captured in an earlier battle. As a condition of the release, the British ordered the Americans not to return to shore during the attack on Baltimore in September, 1814. While watching the bombardment of Fort McHenry from a ship anchored in Baltimore's harbor, Francis Scott

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Key wrote the initial verse of "The Star Spangled Banner" on the backside of a letter while watching the large American flag waving over the fort that morning. Back in Baltimore, he continued working until he had completed four verses (only one of which is commonly known today).

Ironically, the melody Key assigned to accompany the lyrics of "The Star-Spangled Banner" was a popular English drinking song called "To Anacreon in Heaven." Written around 1775 by John Stafford Smith, the song honored the ancient Greek poet Anacreon, a lover of wine. The Anacreontic Song, as it was known, had a track record of popularity in the United States by 1814.

Thousands of years ago, people in the Persian Empire put snow in a bowl, poured concentrated grape juice over it, and ate it as a treat. Even when the weather was hot, they would savor this sweet treat. Their trick? They placed snow in underground chambers known as yakchal where the temperatures kept the snow from melting. The Persians hiked to the mountain tops by their summer capital to gather snowfall.

MemorialDay/HelloSummer event was a blast!! Thank you everyone who participated and helped! We really had a great time! Here are some moments from that day!








June 1st was our last Zumba class until the fall! Zumba classes were awesome! We all had a great time! Thank you everyone who participated!

The City of New Port Richey Fire Department is launching a **Residential Knox Home Box** Campaign. You may have seen a version of the Knox Box on many commercial buildings in the city; the Residential Knox Home Box is an extension of that service. The Knox Home Box is a key safe that stores a key to a residential property. The box is mounted outside the residence and can be unlocked only by the Fire Department when Firefighters and/or Paramedics need rapid entry into the home. During an emergency, this voluntary alternative allows first responders to

enter without forcing entry, delaying entry, or not entering.

If you are over 65, live in the city limits, are mobility challenged, and have a medical alert system or history of medical issues, you may be eligible for a free Residential Knox Home Box. If you believe you may qualify, submit an application. The City has a limited number of the Knox Home Boxes for residents to install themselves. The boxes are available on loan and free of charge until the homeowner moves.

In addition, residents can purchase a Knox Home Box with the City of New Port Richey Keyway online at www.knoxbox.com.

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At first, "The Star-Spangled Banner" trailed "Yankee Doodle." But during and immediately after the Civil War, Key's song gained a deeper meaning, as the American flag became an increasingly powerful symbol of national unity. In 1889, the U.S. Navy officially adopted "The Star-Spangled Banner." In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson ordered that "The Star-Spangled Banner" be played at military and other appropriate occasions.

"The Star Spangled Banner" made its sporting-event debut in September 1918, during that year's first World Series game between the Chicago Cubs and Boston Red Sox. In addition to the ongoing toll of World War I, a cloud of violence hung over Chicago's Comiskey Park, as a bomb had torn apart the Chicago Federal Building just the day before. During the seventh-inning stretch,



the military band on hand struck up "The Star-Spangled Banner," and in a moving spectacle, players and fans alike fell silent and saluted the flag. The practice soon spread across major league baseball, and into other sports, and eventually became a widely accepted pregame tradition. In 1931, President Herbert Hoover signs a congressional act making "The Star-Spangled Banner" the official national anthem of the United States.

How To Spot A Rip Current

Are you planning a trip to the beach? First, know the beach conditions before you go. Knowledge — including how to spot a rip current and how to escape one — can make all the

difference between life and death. A recent string of deaths tied to dangerous surf conditions at Florida's Gulf Coast beaches have experts warning even the best swimmers to stay out of the water and not risk their lives.


According to the National Weather Service, rip currents are strong, narrow, seaward flows of water that extend from close to the shoreline to outside the surf zone. They are found on almost any beach with breaking waves and act as "rivers of the sea," moving sand, marine organisms, and other material offshore.

While officials say the best way to avoid getting caught in a rip current is always to swim near a lifeguard; however, a lifeguard may not always be available. The key to safety is understanding what a rip current is and how to spot one.

The following list provides tips on how to best spot rip currents:

- Spotting rip currents from an elevated position overlooking the beach is much easier. This might be from a parking lot, beach access, sand dune or headland.
- Always watch the water for several minutes as rip current conditions can change.
- Channelized rip currents are the easiest to identify as they typically appear as darker, narrow gaps of water heading offshore between areas of breaking waves and whitewater. They can appear as darker paths heading out through the surf, so look for gaps in the lines of breaking waves.
- Look for narrow regions of choppy, rippled water heading offshore. Waves moving toward shore may steepen due to opposing offshore rip current flows, leading to a different surface water texture.
- Look for plumes of sand or foam offshore of the breakers, often moved away from shore by rip currents.
- Some types of rips, such as flash rips, can appear as narrow sections of turbulent whitewater heading offshore.
- * Wear polarized sunglasses to help identify contrasting colors in the water deep rip current channels stand out as darker water.
- Ask a lifeguard if there are any rip currents and to point them out for you.


