The **Marigold** is a member of the Asteraceae family, also called the Daisy family. It's known for its strong odor and bright colors that commands

attention with its radiant orange and yellow hues. This sun-loving plant not only adds a pop of color to any garden but also carries deep cultural and symbolic significance. This captivating flower symbolizes the warmth and intensity of the sun, as well as passion, creativity, and the cyclical nature of life and death. It's often associated with eternal affection, making the Marigold a perfect symbol for those born in the vibrant month of October.



The **Cosmos** flower that is commonly seen in gardens or fall centerpieces is usually yellow, orange, purple, pink, or white. However, they all come from the same family attributed to

Sunflowers, Asters, and Daisies. The name Cosmos derives from "κόσμος" (kosmos), an ancient Greek word that means "order" or "arrangement." It refers to the world and its cosmic organization that reflects harmony, peace, love, and beauty. Different shades of the Cosmos have slightly different meanings. Bright-colored Cosmos typically symbolize wholeness and peace, while pink Cosmos reflect a mother's love and general affection. The white Cosmos can also

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symbolize purity, balance, and modesty. However, no matter what shade, the universal meaning of harmony and love remains.

## October 21 ~ "NATIONAL" SWEETEST DAY



National Sweetest Day began as a holiday founded by the National Confectioners' Association called Candy Day. On October 16, 1916, candy shops around the country filled newspapers announcing their sweetest treats and delights calling it the "Sweetest Day of the Year." Americans were encouraged to patronize their local candy shops, bakers, and druggists for the highest quality confections. By 1917 when war was raging in Europe, many retailers encouraged patrons to "Get one for yourself and one for the boys overseas!" But then in April 1918, when the United States officially entered the war in Europe, there came rationing. Sugar,


as well as many other commodities, became scarce and the holiday was cancelled. With the end of the war in 1919, sweetness returned to October. So sweet in fact, Candy Day became an entire week!

The first actual **Sweetest Day** was in Cleveland, Ohio on October 10, 1921. It was a day to share romantic expressions and deeds of charity or kindness. It was planned by a committee of 12 confectioners. The committee distributed over 20,000 boxes of candy to newsboys, orphans, old folks, and the poor. In 1923, the day kicked into a full charitable swing when four Michigan confectioners united with the Red Cross. Together they distributed thousands of bags of candy to hospitals, orphanages, shelters, and homes across Michigan. The celebration also included 100 regulation army target balloons, which dropped coupons worth a box of candy. In 1929, Sweetest Day settled into its current home, the third Saturday in October.

For over 100 years, National Sweetest Day encourages everyone to be generous even in the smallest ways. This day reminds us that even small tokens improve the lives of those around us. While the observance started with candy and sweets given to our sweethearts and friends, the day is full of lessons in persistence, resilience, and doing small things greatly. On National Sweetest Day (October 21st this year) not only acknowledge your loved ones, but also take care of those who need some extra attention or recognition. A little treat, a card, or a show of support during a time of need may be the sweetest gift on this day. Just a little sweetness can mean so much!

#### F.Y.I.

The question was asked: Why do I have to pay for my skylight? The answer: Skylights are classified as WINDOWS. The HOA bylaws state homeowners are responsible for their windows and doors. There are approximately 100 skylights; the replacement costs for every skylight would be \$80,000.00. Regarding this project the additional cost would be approximately \$18,400.00. Skylights are not **common** they belong to the homeowner not the HOA. Not everyone enjoys the benefit of having one.

Please note the **recommendation** to replace your skylight was made because your current unit is 25 - 30 years old. It has age related corrosion and offers no insulating or UV blocking ability. What better time to replace than with a new roof. You may keep the current unit as is or you may have the roofer remove and close up the opening.

The question was asked; What if I would like to add a skylight? The answer: That is ok, however it must go through an HOA Architectural Review process. The HOA Buildings and Architecture would need to have a committee meeting to review and approve, disapprove, or modify your request. Any architectural changes would have to be in line with the current look of every home. Example a skylight would only be placed in the back of the building. If you are thinking of adding or removing a skylight, keep in mind *ALL interior work is the responsibility of the homeowner*. This means the closing of or construction of the light shaft in the ceiling.

**The question was asked:** How much would it cost to hire an HOA management company? **The answer:** The national average is \$10 - \$20 per residence. If we use \$15.00 per residence, the annual cost for BP would be \$35,000.00 per year approximate. This would be in addition to all current operating costs not to include any needed future increases.
